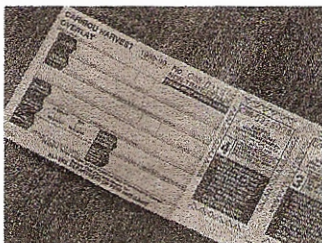

By turning in these tags reporting the caribou you caught, Fish & Game know how many animals we need to have for food each year. If we don't turn them in they think we don't catch caribou.

This is a new program through the State of Alaska that is aimed at making sure that all children have health insurance. It looks like very good insurance. Eligibility is based on your income level. There is a copy of the income criteria and copies of the application available at the Village Council Office.

Arctic Care by Sandra Alvarez

The military is providing health services to villages in the Bristol Bay Region. For those of us in the Lake area, they will be sending a veterinarian to every village to dog care and shots, including rabies, parvo and de-worming. Dental services will be available in two villages, Nondalton and Kokhanok. People from surrounding villages are welcome to go to those villages and also receive care.

Igiugig Veterinarian = March 29-30

Dental in Kokhanok = March 27 - April 1

Do you know where your dog is? There have been a lot of dogs running loose in the village lately. These dogs annoy everyone and cause the dogs that are home to bark continuously. We also are trying to prevent anyone from getting mauled by dogs. REMEMBER that Village Council Policy is that ALL dogs are to be kept on the owner's property, either tied, fenced, or otherwise restrained. Igiugig School Book Fair by Bonnie Thurston

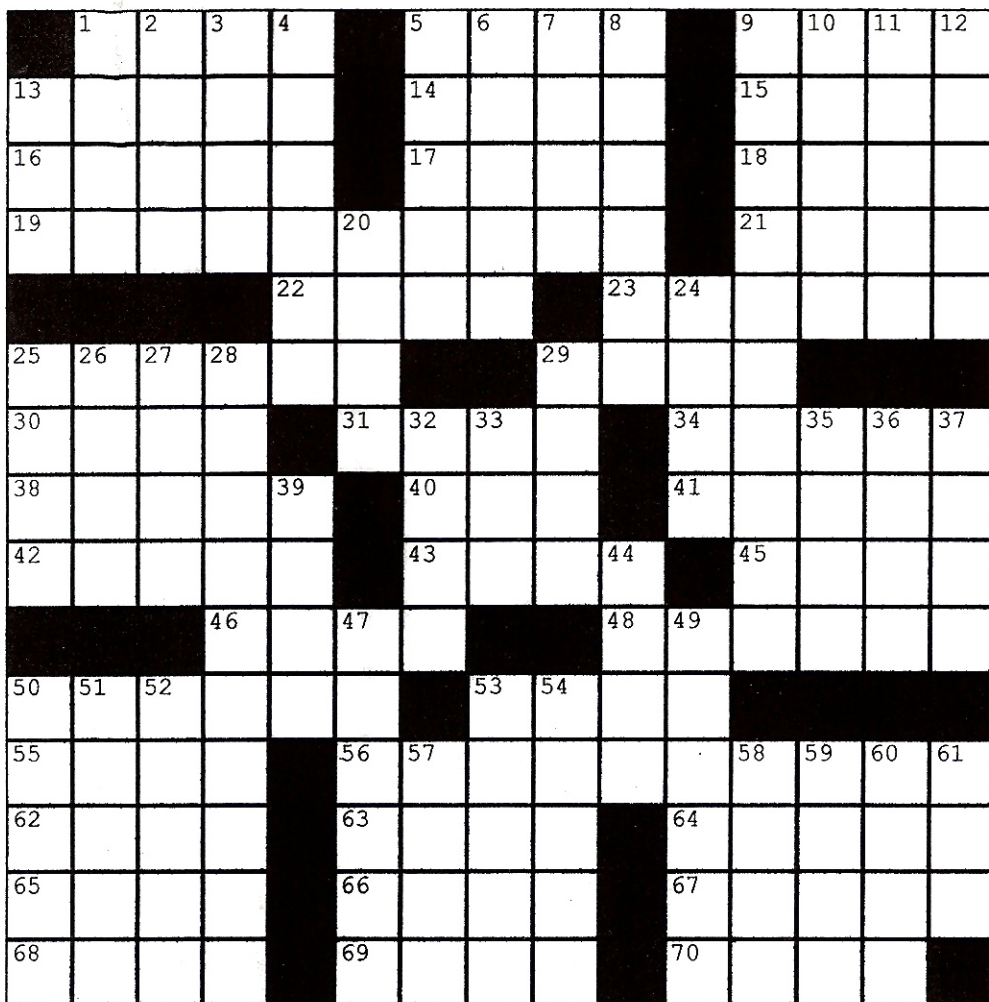
