
August 7th 1942 to July 17th 2015

Pete Lee Hill of Naknek, AK peacefully departed for heaven on July 17, 2015 with his beloved wife Barbara Jane Hill by his side. Pete was born in Iliamna, AK on August 7, 1942. He claims he was born under a table on a rainy day because it was the only place that was dry, which we've learned wasn't entirely true...but it was a good story. He was a lifelong resident of Alaska with most of his life spent in the Iliamna Lake and Bristol Bay areas, where he was part of a large family of Hills and Wilsons.

Pete was preceded in death by his father William Hill, his mother Katie Wilson, step-father Chester Wilson, and brothers Frank Hill, Robert Hill, and Kenny Wilson. He is survived by siblings Shirley Nielsen, Lary Hill, Karen Nicolson,

Putting away fish for family, friends, and elders...taking care of my kids fulltime around the clock...pushing an ever mountainous collection of paperwork...and sometimes all three simultaneously is a little glimpse of what my July has been all about. I thank everyone for their patience with me during this summer's hectivity. We have had so many laughs in the office realizing now where some of the peculiar Dan Salmonisms come from, as we can finally relate a little more to his work life. Needless to say, I've missed him more than ever before.

At the height of our summer, we had twenty one people in Igiugig, none of them here as tour-

ists. All of them were here for our hydrokinetic demonstration project and our water-treatment upgrade project, all the activity that has fueled our local economy in addition to those that have come here to fish. Our local lodges and camps, boats, and trucks were rented by University of Washington scientists, CCI Industry safety specialist, Ocean Renewable Power Company personnel, Iliamna Lake Contractor personnel, LGL biologists, Marsh Creek LLC personnel, mechanics, and the sort. The week of July 14th the device was deployed, and putting clean power to the grid!

Meanwhile, most of the men were gone fishing for the summer, so we relied on lodge personnel to help out with activities such as teaching us how to operate the fire truck, or reversing our tanker trucks, and Jocko -

the one man show—to help change tires or garage doors. We relied on our volunteer WWOOFERS for help with net setting, keeping up with wood chopping and yard maintenance for our elders, and keeping the village looking beautiful.

We ended June with a visit from KattiJo who is completing an ecotourism study for Igiugig. Then on July 1st Lisa Murkowski and rural staffer Deborah Vo visited for an energy tour. We had the opportunity to discuss rural issues, and show off Igiugig Village, -- the greenhouse, the wind turbines, the solar thermal activity, the powerhouse and the ORPC RivGen® Unit. Christina provided freshly made salmon caviar, smoked salmon on cracker, and greenhouse fresh tomatoes and basil with mozzarella for the occasion. We celebrated more on July 4th with a

community picnic and parade. Even though it was raining and we barbecued indoors, everyone was in high spirits since the burn ban was finally lifted and we were happy for rain to nourish the berries.

Now at the end of month we will be completing a gas card system install. As for the water upgrade – the intake has been installed, the water storage tank is substantially complete, and the interior work is coming together. On to AUGUST!

River Operations – RivGen® Power System Demonstration Project






Figure 2 Project Location on the Kvichak River, Igiugig, Alaska. Come ashore location of medium voltage cable is at the red triangle, yellow and green dots denote anchor locations.

Please be advised that ORPC Alaska, in collaboration with the Village of Igiugig, has installed a hydrokinetic turbine, the RivGen® Power System, in the upper Kvichak River (Figure I). This device, which generates electricity from the river's current, is submerged and located near the west bank of the river between Fish and Game and Fly Islands (approximately a half mile from the head of the river). This project has been sited through consultation with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the U.S. Coast Guard. The area of the device and its mooring system is shown in Figure 2 and is marked by a



Mariners and pilots are encouraged to travel outside of the buoys either closer to the east or west bank of the river and to avoid travelling between the buoys as this path goes directly over the submerged turbine, which is as close as 4.5' to the surface in certain places depending on the water level of the river. In addition, a flow instrument in the center of the device is only 2.5' below the surface. A submerged medium voltage power cable comes ashore at the upstream end of Fish and Game Island and camera cables that come ashore on the west side of the river. Although these cables are submerged they are not buried and may be close to the water's surface in shallow areas near Fish and Game Island and the river's west bank. Warning signs are located near where the cables come ashore.

This project is temporary and will be removed in September. A table summarizing the project details is given below.

What do Youth Value about Igiugig? - The PhotoVoice Assignment

Hello All! KattiJo "Katie" Deeter here. I had a chance to meet many of you during my first visit last October, and then most recently in June. I am a graduate student at the University of Alaska Fairbanks, studying Rural Tourism Development in the Department of Natural Resource Management. The Igiugig Village Council has welcomed me into your beautiful community, and has invited me to help them produce a road map for potential tourism development.

I understand there are already a lot of tourists who pass through Igiugig, most of whom are on their way to nearby fishing lodges. The Village Council is interested in creating more local tourism opportunities within your community, perhaps instead of, or in addition to, fishing. Local tourism of this nature could create more local jobs, keep youth engaged during the summer months, promote the preservation of traditional cultural values and customs, and create a larger network of Igiugig lovers and supporters who care about the local issues that matter to you.

In June I conducted 20 interviews with Igiugig residents and began the process of gathering your thoughts, feelings and opinions about tourism in your community. At this time I also passed out six digital cameras to resident youth, and gave them an assignment: Take pictures of the Top I0 things you love/value about Igiugig. The youth have also been asked to complete Photo Reflection Sheets for each photograph to help them explain what they took a picture of, why, and what ideas it gives them about tourism. The goal is to use these photos and reflection sheets to promote a community dialogue about what things in Igiugig you all may want to share with visitors, which things you prefer to keep private, and other topics related to tourism development in your community. Because the pictures are used to create discussion, this process is called PhotoVoice. It's a pretty popular technique, and has been used by communities all around the world!

The youth are to have all of their 10 photographs taken and sheets filled out by August 20, 2015. When they are finished, they can turn their cameras and photo reflection sheets into AlexAnna. Once collected, the cameras will be sent to me in Fairbanks. I will print the photos and bring them with me when I make another visit to Igiugig in September. At that time, I would like to get together with the PhotoVoice participants again. We can discuss their photos and get them ready to be shared with the whole community, hopefully at one of your fun and delicious pot luck dinners!

Thanks again to everyone who has/is participating in this research on tourism in Igiugig. Can't wait to see you all again soon!


Summer Reading Club!

The Battle of the Books have all been catalogued & organized by grade level & are ready for checking out. We also have new books trickling into the library. Here are a few interesting titles:


