Since then, the program has focused on each Apprentice taking turns to host "Master-Apprentice" gatherings, aiming for the goal of meeting at least three times per week. One was held at Neqlercurvik, a session on Maniaq, with language on "light the fire," "poke the stick through the meat," and "turn the meat quickly so it doesn't burn."

The feeling of endless time and limitless freedom.


IGIUGIG VILLAGE CLEAN UP
